Letter From the President



It is said that time flies when you're having fun. Operation Medical and our volunteers are certainly having a good time in serving needy and deserving people around the globe, which has made these last three years pass by in a flash. A lot has been accomplished in our first three years of existence. We have

strengthened our organizational structure, and our service levels speak for themselves. We completed seven mission trips: Haiti (3), India (3) and Malawi (1). We also planned two trips that had to be cancelled. Our 2015 Malawi trip was called off due to reconstruction of operating rooms and a trip this year to Kenya was cancelled due to a government order cancelling all trips by foreign doctors. We will continue to pursue a location in Africa in the future. Over 1,200 patients have benefited from our services - mostly definitive surgical procedures. Operation Medical fills a very small portion of a large void in this area of needed surgeries around the globe.

In March 2016, we went through a strategic planning retreat to guide us to the next level of growth for Operation Medical - from both an organizational and a service enhancement standpoint. As a follow up to all the recommendations coming out of the retreat, we have made many improvements in our communications (internal and external), reorganized and expanded the Board with skilled individuals and, most

importantly, hired a part-time executive director to coordinate with the Board our future course. We are especially grateful to Mary Jensik who took on the responsibility of serving as our executive director for the first three years in addition to her role as Treasurer. She was instrumental in getting us this far and will continue to help in the future in her many roles and responsibilities. We also owe thanks to all the Board members for their time and talent contributions, as well as all the volunteers for their enthusiastic participation in our mission trips abroad and with our local warehouse activities.

We have not done a single fundraising event since our inception, but we have been fortunate to receive generous contributions from individuals, foundations and other organizations. We thank all of them for their help in serving the needy people. Most of our volunteers use their own vacation time and pay for most of their mission related expenses. Operation Medical provides a financial subsidy to some of the nurses on a need basis.

We fully intend to proceed aggressively to fulfill our stated mission of providing good quality medical care to areas around the world where such care is not available.

2015-2016 In Numbers

A SURGICAL CRISIS IN THE DEVELOPING WORLD

The spring issue of *Public Health* from the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health included an article about the need for more surgeons in developing countries. In this article it stated, "Of the 234 million surgeries performed in 2008, only 3.5 percent took place in the poorest countries, whose people account for 35 percent of the world's population. The World Bank estimates that 11 percent of the global disease burden is treatable by surgery. Two billion people have no access to surgical care..."

Historically, the emphasis in bringing better health care to the developing world has focused on treating and preventing infectious disease. Over the past few years, the emphasis has slowly been shifting to preventing and better managing non-communicable diseases before illness gets to the point of requiring surgery. However, there is no getting around the need for surgery, and it is often a matter of life and death.

The main problem is lack of people in developing regions who are qualified to provide this higher-level of care and a lack of the resources and infrastructure needed to train future generations of surgeons. Bringing surgeons and other providers in from the U.S. may be the best way to address the problem right now.



Operation Medical hopes to play a small part in changing the lives of people in developing countries by providing surgeons and training for local medical staff while countries work to gain the capacity to train their own surgeons.

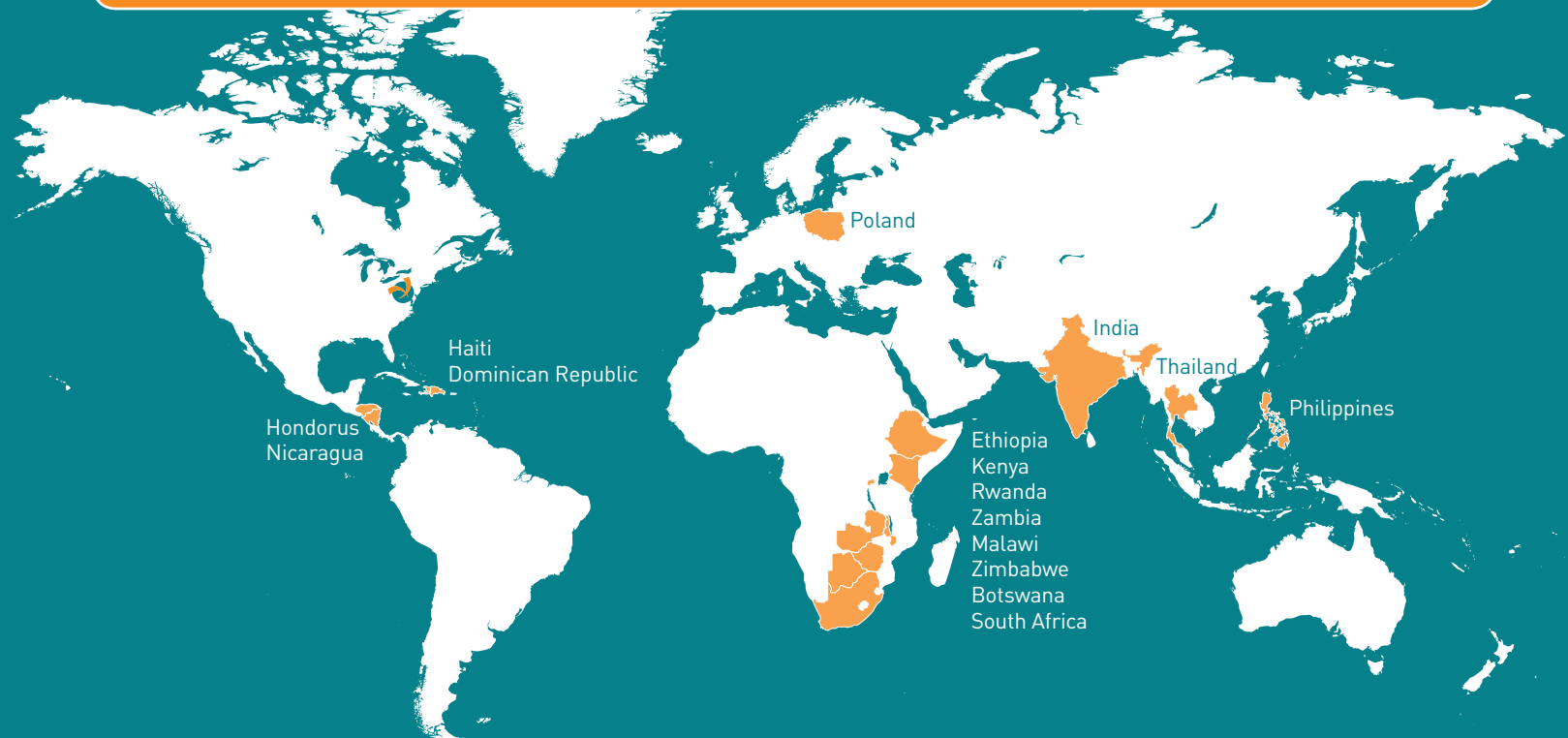

Operation Medical Returns To Pierre Payen Hospital In Montrouis, Haiti

This was Operation Medical's THIRD trip to Hospital Pierre Payen and was held from October 21 to November 4, 2015. The team members included a large contingent from New England and, under the leadership of Dr. John Judson and Dr. Jeffrey Segil, were able to see 150 patients in surgery clinic and 100 patients in gynecology clinic for a total of 250 patients.

Over the course of the mission trip there were many challenges, beginning with crowding and confusion in the clinics, as well as the workload for the medical providers! Management was improved by placing a nurse at the front door receiving area and having a nurse practitioner for primary staffing of the surgery clinic. There also were two major infrastructure problems. Electrical supply issues were critical due to the fact that one of the generators failed and the other one was inadequate to provide power to both the medical clinic and the hospital. The hospital rented a large generator to provide power to the hospital including the autoclaves and the air-conditioners in the operating room. In addition to the electricity, the autoclave was problematic because there was a lack of ongoing maintenance and biomedical technicians in Haiti who are familiar with that particular type of autoclave. Since this mission, a new autoclave has been purchased and plans are being made to purchase a new generator.

On a good note, Dr. Judson stated that "the hospital hired a new administrator who is working well with the visiting teams ...and in general, when the team arrived, the hospital was clean and there appeared to be an increased number of nurses. We are increasingly dependent upon the Haitian nurses and are finding that working with them is increasingly productive."

Patient Procedures: The team performed 150 surgical procedures during the mission trip, which included circumcisions, excisional biopsies, hydrocele repairs, hysterectomies, lipoma removals, uterine myomectomies, and an assortment of minor procedures.

India 2016 Surgical Mission To Panna Civil Hospital

On January 14, 2016, a group of 11 volunteers left Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, to start their long journey to Panna, India. The group flew out of Washington Dulles Airport to New Delhi, India. After a five hour layover, they boarded a five hour flight from Delhi to Khajuraho, India. A one hour bumpy car ride brought the group of weary travelers to Panna at 5 p.m. local time on January 16. Volunteers from Washington State and New York were awaiting the team as they arrived at the hotel.

Mission supply bags were transported to the hospital, and the group had a meal and rested up for the busy days ahead. On January 17, they hit the ground running at 7:30 a.m. and started sorting and organizing the supplies. Additionally, they reviewed the operating rooms and set up patient visits. Their gracious hosts provided a welcome "opening ceremony" that morning that included local officials, which was covered by local press.

Back in the United States, the "Blizzard of 2016" did all she could to thwart travel for a couple other volunteer surgeons traveling to join us. The storm dumped over 30 inches of snow, but the determined travelers did arrive two days late and with no luggage! The combination of international travel in winter can often be challenging.

Patient Procedures:

The team performed 225 surgical cases during the two week mission. We learned that our group provided the first general anesthesia at this hospital in more than two years.

The majority of cases, performed under spinal anesthesia, included:

Hernia Repairs:

- Hydrocele
- Hemorrhoids
- Hysterectomies

Other Surgeries Included:

- Plastic surgeries such as cleft lip repairs and burn scar releases
- Gall bladder removals
- Urinary bladder stone removals
- We even provided anesthesia for a local obstetrician performing an emergency c-section!

We are pleased to report there were no major complications noted during the two week camp as well as when we followed up with the hospital administration three weeks after the mission. Operation Medical donated a set of Lifebox pulse oximeters to the hospital for use on all their surgeries/anesthesia monitoring. We also conducted a brief training/in-service to the local anesthesia providers. Additionally, we left a substantial amount of unused supplies for the hospital to use for their cases.

The local administrative and staff support for the mission was phenomenal. Room and board facilities were more than adequate, and the food was very good. No one was indisposed during the entire mission, which is amazing in itself.

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Upcoming Surgical Missions

Haiti - October 15-29, 2016

Our FOURTH mission to Pierre Payan Hospital is being planned, and team leaders Dr. John Judson and Dr. Jeff Segil are currently evaluating team members needed for the camp. The trip is scheduled from October 15-29, 2016, and it is expected this year that the team will include urology in addition to gynecology and general surgery. Goals for this trip include working with the Haitian nursing staff to utilize chart binders for inpatients and greater involvement of Haitian anesthesia and surgery staff in our surgical cases. We look forward to even more improvements in the hospital administration and functioning generators.

Tentative plans include touring the Hospital Albert Schweitzer in Borel and the University of Mirabelais Hospital.

India - January 21-27, 2017

Operation Medical is planning its SECOND surgical mission trip to Kasturba Hospital, located in Valsad, India. The trip is being planned from January 21-27, 2017. So that we can address more specifically the needs of the hospital and the community, Operation Medical has agreed to provide a camp similar to the 2014 camp with an emphasis on oncology detection and surgeries as appropriate. It is planned that the team will include gynecologic, general, plastics, urology, head and neck, and eye surgeons.

Other Operation Medical Activities

The Pennsylvania United Cricket Association

On October 25, 2015, The Pennsylvania United Cricket Association (PAUCA) introduced Operation Medical to its membership at its annual awards ceremony. Operation Medical Co-Sponsors the Pennsylvania Association of Nurse Anesthetists Annual Meeting

The Pennsylvania Association of Nurse Anesthetists (PANA) represents over 3,600 Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetists (CRNAs) and students across the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. CRNAs are anesthesia professionals who safely administer more than 33 million anesthetics to patients each year in the United States. In addition to providing continual education to its members, PANA also offers advocacy education, public relations opportunities, membership development and mentoring and practice support. The PANA is divided into four districts with District III being representative of Southeast Pennsylvania.

On March 18 - 19, 2016 District III held its annual meeting at the Hotel

Hershey in Hershey, Pennsylvania. The primary focus of the annual meeting is to not only provide continuing education for members of District III but also from other districts.

The focus of this Annual Education Seminar was on Family Health - Physical, Psychological, Work Stress and Survival.

Ongoing Strategic Planning

Operation Medical was founded in 2013 with a strong mission, a realistic vision and leadership dedicated to the success of the organization. Three years later, we are able to say with confidence that Operation Medical has remained true to its charge; we are well on our way to meeting our vision; and our leadership's commitment to success remains strong and active. To assure ongoing success, the Board of Directors held a strategic planning session in March 2016 led by management consultant Nancy Dering Mock.

The Board started by looking back over the last three years. It reaffirmed Operation Medical's mission and vision, reviewed the organization's strengths and challenges, and was able to acknowledge an overall good track record for Operation Medical. The future was explored next, and strategies were generated related to our missions/programs, fund development, public relations and marketing, board development, staff, and internal communication/

coordination. To that end, our leadership identified four goals and assigned committees to help lead the way in achieving positive outcomes. The committees have been meeting and making recommendations to the Board and are engaged in related actions. A brief summary of the goals are provided below.

GOAL 1 devotes additional attention to development and implementation of an external communications strategy. Currently underway are steps to enhance our website, increase media coverage and participate in public events.

GOAL 2 addresses new and ongoing board development, recruitment and engagement activities. We are fortunate to have skilled and dedicated leaders, and we recognize that planning and action are essential to keeping it that way now and in the future.

GOAL 3 calls for the hiring and training of staff. Operation Medical's treasurer, Mary Jensik, had been generously volunteering her time in also serving as the organization's executive director. Through her efforts, the Board agreed that the position was now well established and Operation Medical was ready to contract with an executive. The Board engaged a consultant to serve as executive director in May.

GOAL 4 is to strengthen internal planning, scheduling and communication. While this is important for any organization, it has added significance for organizations with volunteer leaders and participants whose time is often limited due to external commitments. Operation Medical's executive director will be devoting much of her activities to this goal.

We are committed to continually evaluating and updating Operation Medical's strategic plan to best serve the organization, recipients of our medical care and education, and our supporters. Watch for more updates.

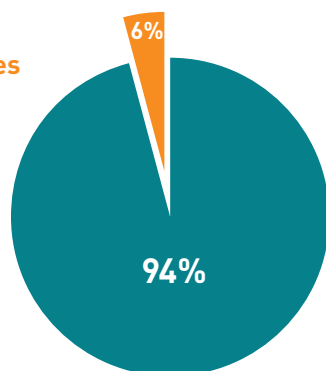
2015-2016 Financials
