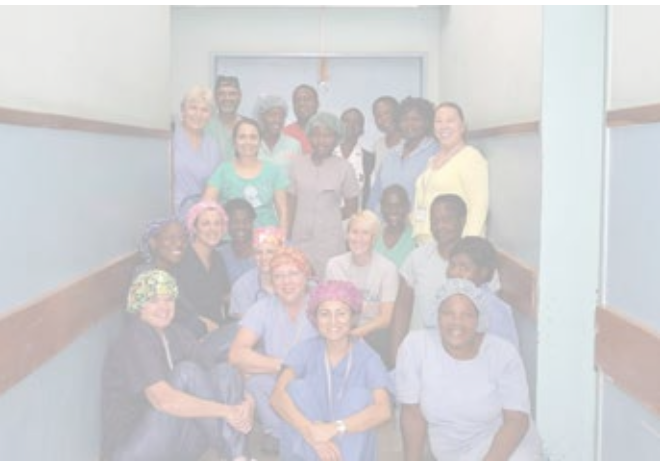

2014-2015 In Numbers

According to the Global Health 2035 Report by the Lancet Commission (Commission) on Investing in Health, millions of people are dying from common, easily treatable conditions like appendicitis, fractures, or obstructed labor because they do not have access to or can't afford proper surgical care. The Lancet is a weekly peer-reviewed general medical journal that is one of the oldest and best known general medical journals and has been described as one of the most prestigious medical journals in the world. The Commission reveals that five billion people worldwide do not have access to safe and affordable surgery and anesthesia when they need it. Just under a third of all deaths in 2010 (32.9%, 16.9 million deaths) were from conditions treatable with surgery. New estimates produced for the Commission find there is a global shortfall of at least 143 million surgical procedures every year.

While these facts seem overwhelming and Operation Medical's "numbers" seem small, we believe we can contribute to directly change the lives of our patients.

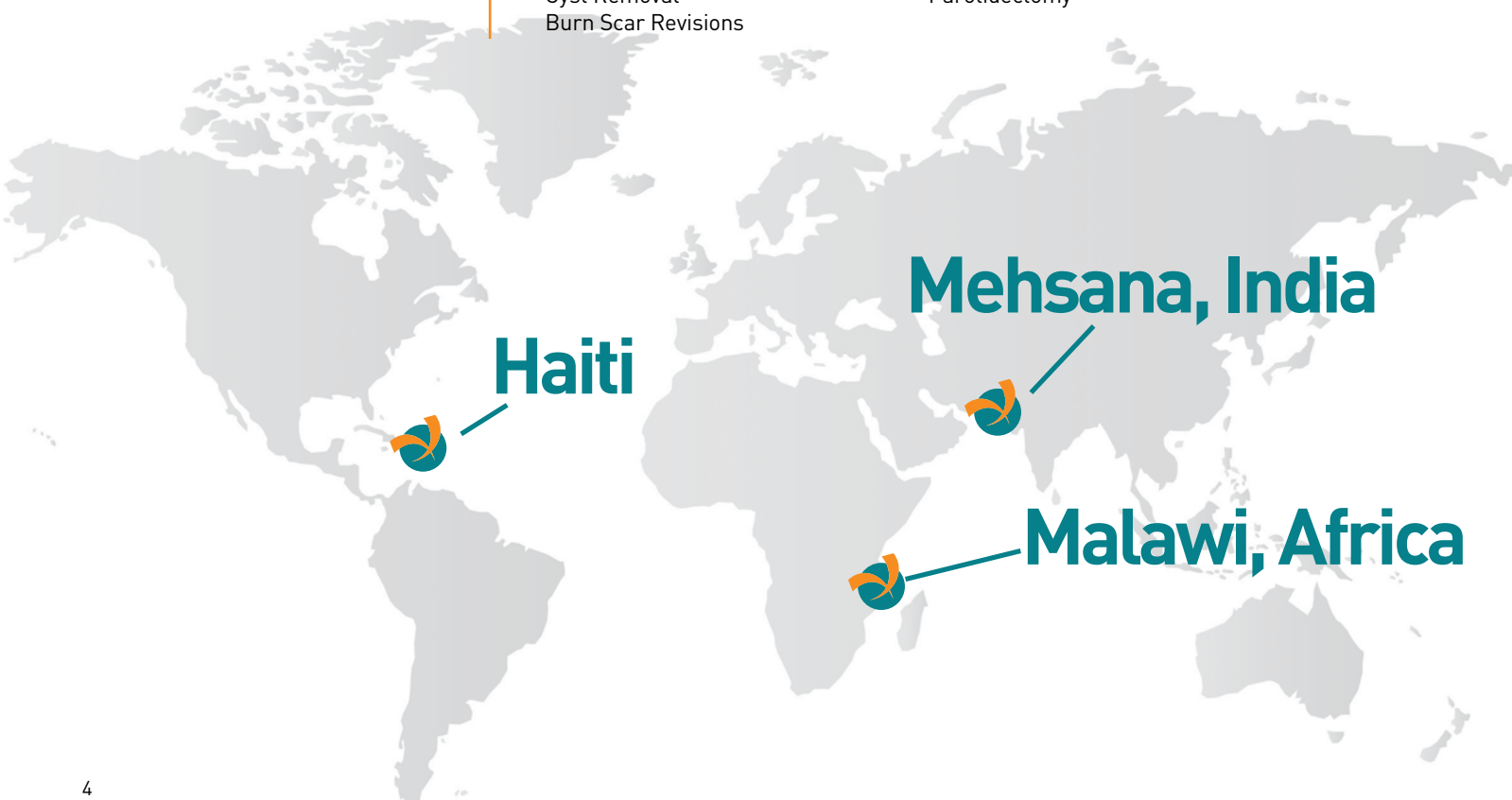

Operation Medical's First Surgical Mission in Malawi Africa is a Success

Operation Medical's first surgical mission for its 2014/2015 year took place in Malawi, Africa. The team performed 59 surgical procedures in the operating rooms and 120 procedures in the emergency room at Kamuzu Central Hospital located in Lilongwe the capital of Malawi. Dr. Baker Henson, and the mission leader said, "The mission was very successful considering it was the first mission in Malawi for Operation Medical. In one week's time the team made a significant impact on a local area in Malawi. The entire team worked exceptionally well together and remained flexible throughout the mission. Each individual was key to the success of the mission." Dr. Henson is looking forward to future missions in Malawi.

Malawi is a small country in southern Africa and is situated east of Zambia, west and north of Mozambique and south of Tanzania. Malawi has a population of approximately 16.5 million people. About 80% of the population lives in rural areas with 53% of the population below the poverty line. Life expectancy is 52 years. As of now there are less than 50 registered surgeons working in the country. Lilongwe, the capital of Malawi, has a population of approximately 800,000 people and is located on the main road between Zambia and Lake Malawi. The population of Lilongwe is rapidly growing due to extreme poverty and starvation that brings people from rural villages into the city. Kazumu Central Hospital is a government run hospital and is the tertiary referral center for the central region of Malawi serving about 6 million persons. Estimates of the hospital's size range from 600 to 1,000 beds; however, actual occupancy is probably closer to 1,200 to 1,500 occupancy. The hospital has four operating theatres and one ICU with four beds. The majority of their patients are those who cannot afford private facilities. Currently there are three general surgeons on staff at Kazumu Central Hospital.

Mission Details and Participants

The five-day camp was held at Kazumu Hospital from October 6 to October 10, 2014. Prior to the start of the five-day camp, Dr. Bipin Patel presented a lecture to 3rd year medical students attending the Medical College of Lilongwe. The lecture, "Gastro-Intestinal Malignancies," was presented to 18 students and focused predominately on colon cancer.

Fifty nine procedures were performed on patients in the operating theatres and 120 procedures were performed in the emergency room. The ages of the patients ranged from two months to 75 years. The operating room team utilized three operating stations in two operating theatres.

Operation Medical also owes a huge thank you to World Camp for providing us a safe and comfortable living environment close to Kazumu Central Hospital.



Operation Medical's Second Surgical Mission To Haiti

In October 2014 Operation Medical conducted its second surgical mission trip to Haiti. The team went to the Pierre Payen Hospital located approximately two hours from the city of Port-au-Prince. This year's mission team members saw the results of a cervical cancer screening program that previously was started by Dr. Julie Bleyenbergh. Dr. Bleyenbergh is one of Dr. Jeff Segil's partners at Dover Women's Health. The issue in Haiti is that even if a doctor or nurse takes a pap smear, there is no way to get it read. The patients are not going to drive their own slide 1.5 hours to Port-au-Prince and pay for the pathologist to read the slide. While there are several recommendations worldwide for screening and treatment, one of the best is screening with acetic acid (vinegar). If there is any lesion, it would be treated with cryo (freezing of the cells) to prevent progression. This screening process seems to be seeing results and the prior work put into this program is really starting to pay off. It was satisfying to the Operation Medical team to know that maybe they really had an impact on these women's futures.

Mission Details and Participants

The medical/surgical mission was held at Pierre Payen Hospital from October 19 through October 31, 2014, under the leadership of Operation Medical's team leader Kenneth Goodhart, CRNA. In the words of Dr. Jeff Segil, "The Operation Medical team was welcomed with open arms by the Hospital and local staff and collaboration was excellent."

During the mission the team performed 40 surgeries including emergency procedures and performed 55 sonogram studies.

India 2015 Surgical Mission to Lions General Hospital

Operation Medical third surgical mission for its 2014/2015 year took place in the state of Gujarat, India. The team performed 114 surgical procedures at the Lions General Hospital in the city of Mehsana. Dr. Mukul Parikh was the mission leader.

Mehsana Charitable Trust Foundation is very active in the field of medical services and opened Lions Hospital in 1978. Lions General Hospital is a 260 bed hospital and has many departments including a dental, arthroscopy, orthopedic, urology and cath lab.

Mehsana is one of 33 districts of Gujarat state in western India and is the largest district in Gujarat. The district has a population of over two million people and an area of over 4,500 km. There are 600 villages in the district and a population of approximately 1.8 million people.

Mission Details and Participants

The five-day camp was held at Lions General Hospital from January 18 to January 23, 2015. The ages of the 114 patients ranged from four and a half months to 76 years and the male/female ratio was 55/45. The operating room team utilized six operating stations in four operating theatres.

Other Operation Medical Activities

Rwandan Association of Nurse Anesthetists

Operation Medical's President Elect, Diana Davidson, CRNA, is a member of Health Volunteers Overseas (HVO) and in 2012 traveled to Kigali Rwanda to assist the Rwandan Association of Nurse Anesthetists to complete application to become a member of the International Federation of Nurse Anesthetists. While in Rwanda, Diana met members of the faculty of the school of anesthesia at the Kigali Health Institute.

The relationship between HVO and the Kigali Health Institute continued and the Kigali Health Institute and the National University of Rwanda merged and became the University of Rwanda.

From February 15 to 22, 2015, Diana was asked to become a member of an examination team in Kigali, Rwanda, for the final exam as an external examiner.

There are a number of paths to becoming a nurse anesthetists in Rwanda. One program is a certificate program by which a certificate is awarded after either a basic nursing education or a certificate of anesthesia is issued after 18 months of anesthetic training. These individuals pursued a bachelor's degree in anesthesia, after their certificate program, known as a bridge program. Upon completion from the bridge program, candidates were given both a written and oral exam. Diana was asked to review the written questions and participate in the oral exam. The process took one week.

Going forward, HVO now will have an active role in the educational process of nurse anesthetists. Diana will be the director of this program.

District III of PANA Educational Meeting

The Pennsylvania Association of Nurse Anesthetists consists of four educational districts. Central Pennsylvania is part of District III. From March 27 - 28, 2015, District III held their educational meeting at the Hotel Hershey.

During this meeting a fundraiser for Operation Medical was held. Two iPad Minis were purchased and auctioned to the participants of the meeting. In addition, participants of the conference were told about Operation Medical, flyers were distributed and questions answered. Sue Miller, CRNA, one of our mission participants and Co-Chair of the Operation Medical Warehouse Committee, manned the table. Operation Medical raised \$1,060 from this event.

District III plans to continue to support Operation Medical in their future events.

Shree Academy of Arts Supports Operation Medical

On December 13, 2014, The Shree Academy of Arts presented a dance recital "The Path - A Bharatanatyam Repertoire." Bansari Mandalia, RN, an Operation Medical volunteer, and founder of the Shree Academy of Arts truly presented a magical journey of rhythm, music and emotions.

Bharathanatyam is a form of Indian classical dance that originated in the temples of Tamil Nadu and is known for its grace, purity, tenderness, expression and sculpturesque poses. Lord Shiva is considered the God of this dance form.

Bansari not only provided all that attended a stunning dance recital she also graciously donated all proceeds from the event to Operation Medical.

Dr. Mukul L. Parikh, is Co-Recipient of the 2014 Pennsylvania Medical Society's Physician Award for International Volunteer Work

Two Central Pennsylvania physicians with a strong passion for medical volunteer work in underdeveloped countries were named co-recipients of the 2014 Pennsylvania Medical Society's Physician Award for International Voluntary Service.

One of the recipients, Dr. Mukul Parikh is the President of Operation Medical and is a practicing anesthesiologist at Riverside Anesthesia Associates, Chairman, Anesthesia Department at Pinnacle Health Systems; and has participated in more than 15 surgical missions to the Philippines, India, Thailand, Malawi and Ethiopia. In addition, Mukul served the World Surgical Foundation, a Harrisburg-based volunteer organization. On many mission trips, he is joined by his wife and fellow anesthesiologist Neelima Parikh, MD, as well as his sons Ankur and Anuj, both surgeons.

A 28-year member of the Pennsylvania Medical Society, he was nominated for the award by the Dauphin County Medical Society.

Project Homeless Connect

On Thursday September 11, 2014, Operation Medical and Holy Spirit Hospital participated in a joint effort to administer flu vaccines to attendees of Project Homeless Connect. The Capital Area Coalition on Homeless held their third annual Project Homeless Connect, a public outreach to the homeless. Project Homeless Connect, targets the hardest-to-reach men, women, teens and children who are in a shelter, about to leave a shelter, or living in the street. The project offered flu shots, glucose, health and dental screening as well as childcare and pet care. Services that were provided were meals and food distribution, connection to social security, hair cuts, mental health connections, drug and alcohol referrals and a connection to public welfare.

Holy Spirit Health System donated the vaccines and Operation Medical and Holy Spirit donated qualified nurses to screen and to administer the vaccines. This is the first time the hospital and Operation Medical joined in such a venture. The participants from Operation Medical and Holy Spirit were Lisa Lewis RN, Cheryl Sola RN, Melissa Natividad RN, Charmaine Garner RN, Debi Rodkey RN, Rena Effindiva RN, Vanessa Garcia RN, and Diana Davidson CRNA.

The project was well received and 150 doses of flu vaccines administered from 10am to 3pm. The two groups hope to join again in such a venture.



Upcoming Surgical Missions

Haiti - October 25 - 30, 2015

It is hard to believe that Operation Medical is planning its THIRD surgical camp to Pierre Payan Hospital in Montrouis, Haiti. Dr. John Judson is heading the camp and is planning to have a team of about 21 volunteers.

Based on the testimonials of the volunteers returning from the last two missions, providing medical care in Haiti is challenging, but the rewards, at the end of the day are priceless. In Haiti flexibility is a must and Operation Medical understands this concept. Working side-by-side with the wonderful, dedicated staff at Pierre Payan Hospital, Operation Medical is looking forward to its third surgical camp in October 2015.

India 2016

Operation Medical has received many requests from hospitals in India for us to visit and hold surgical camps. As a result, Operation Medical has accepted invitations to two hospitals in India in 2016 for its surgical camp. The camps will be for a week in each location and the hospitals are as follows:

Mahagujarat Hospital, Nadiad, Gujarat, India (January 17 - 22, 2016)

Mahagujarat Hospital is a hospital that provides dermatology, ENT, Gastrointestinal Surgery, Neurosurgery, Physiotherapy, Radiology, Cardiology, Diabetology, Orthopedic, Plastic Surgery, Urology Endocrinology, Gynecology, Obstetrics, and Pulmonology services. The hospital's services also provide a 24 hour accident and emergency care and 24 hour laboratory and blood bank.

Mahagujarat Hospital is located in the city of Nadiad which is said to have been settled by rope dancers. It is also referred to as Nandgam. The city's population is approximately 193,000 with a literacy rate of 95%. In Nadiad, 9% of the population is under 6 years of age. The city is well known for the number nine: there are nine villages or towns located towards all the nine roads that exit from Nadiad, nine step wells around the city, and nine lakes in the city. It is also known as "Shakshar Bhumi" - The land of Educated.

Panna Civil Hospital (January 25 - 29, 2016)

Panna Civil Hospital is located in Panna, India, in the state of Madhya Pradesh in Panna District. The city of Panna has a population of 50,820. The city is famous for its diamond mines and is the administrative center of Panna District. Panna also has a tiger reserve, Panna National Park.

2014 - 2015 Financials

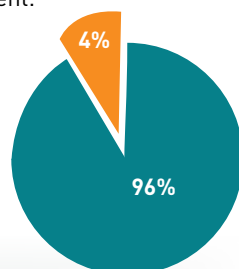
