Pierre Payan Hospital, Haiti - Fall 2015

96% of Haitians lack basic health coverage and access to health care. An Operation Medical team will travel to the Pierre Payan Hospital again in the fall of 2015 to continue the work of providing high quality medical care and education to communities like Artibonite, Haiti where Pierre Payan Hospital is located. We will conduct another surgical mission camp at this hospital located about 2 hours north of the capital city or Port-au-Prince.

Plagued by natural disasters such as hurricanes and earthquakes, the people of Haiti are challenged with deficient sanitation systems; poor nutrition, and inadequate health care services. Approximately 80% of the population lives below the poverty line with less than half the people having access to clean drinking water. There are 25 physicians and 11 nurses per 100,000 covered lives. Operation Medical is committed to continue its efforts to bring high quality health care to the people of Haiti.

Malawi, Africa - October 2015

Operation Medical and World Camp, Inc. are planning their 2nd surgical mission to Malawi, Africa. Malawi is a country, located in east Africa with a population estimated to be 16.7 million. The country ranks among the world's most densely populated and least developed countries. The life expectancy of a person in Malawi is 52 (ranks 210/223) and there are over 1 million living with HIV/AIDS. There are only 50 registered surgeons for a population of 16.7 million people.

Homeless Connect

On Thursday September 11, 2014 Operation Medical and Holy Spirit Hospital participated in a joint effort to administer flu vaccines to attendees of Project Homeless Connect. The Capital Area Coalition on Homeless held their third annual Project Homeless Connect, a public outreach to the homeless. Project Homeless Connect, targets the hardest-to-reach men, women, teens and children who are in shelter, about to leave shelter, or living in the street. The project offered flu shots, glucose, health and dental screening as well as childcare and pet care. Services that were provided were meals and food distribution, connection to social security, hair cuts, mental health connections, drug and alcohol referrals and a connection to public welfare.

Holy Spirit Health System donated the vaccines and Operation Medical and Holy Spirit donated qualified nurses to screen and to administer the vaccines. This is the first time the hospital and Operation Medical joined in such a venture. The participants from Operation Medical and Holy Spirit were Lisa Lewis RN, Cheryl Sola RN, Melissa Natividad RN, Charmaine Garner RN, Debi Rodkey RN, Rena Effindiva RN, Vanessa Garcia RN, and Diana Davidson CRNA,

The project was well received. There were 150 doses of flu vaccines administered from 10-3. The two groups hope to join again in such a venture.



OPERATION MEDICAL'S SECOND SURGICAL MISSION TO HAITI

n October 2014, Operation Medical conducted its second surgical mission trip to Haiti. The team went to the Pierre Payen Hospital, located approximately 2 hours from the city of Port-au-Prince. This year's mission team members saw the results of a cervical cancerscreening program that was started in the past by Dr. Julie Bleyenberg. Dr. Bleyenberg is one of Dr. Jeff Segil's partners at Dover Women's Health. The challenge in Haiti is that even if a doctor or nurse took a pap smear, there is no way to get it read because no one is going to drive their own slide 1.5 hours to Port-au-Prince and pay for the pathologist to read the slide. While there are several recommendations worldwide for screening and treatment, one of the best is screening with acetic acid (vinegar) and if any lesion, treat with cryo (freezing of the cells) to prevent progression. This screening process seems to be seeing results and the prior work put into this program is really starting to pay off. It was satisfying to the Operation Medical team to know that maybe they really had an impact on these women's futures.

Mission Details and Participants

The medical/surgical mission was held at Pierre Payen Hospital from October 19 through October 31, 2014 under the leadership of Operation Medical's team leader Kenneth Goodhart, CRNA. In the words of Dr. Jeff Segil, "the Operation Medical team was welcomed with open arms by the Hospital and local staff and collaboration was excellent."

The team performed numerous emergency procedures, 55 sonograms and 40 surgical cases including:

- Hydroceles
- Hernia Repairs
- Myomectomy
- Circumcision for Phimosis
- Vesico-Vaginal Fistula Repair
- Hysterectomies
- LEEP (5 by Dr. Segil)
- Removal of Ureteral Stents

Operation Medical's First Surgical Mission in Malawi Africa is a Success

peration Medical's first surgical mission for its 2014/2015 year took place in Malawi, Africa. The team performed 59 surgical procedures in the operating rooms and 120 procedures in the emergency room at Kamuzu Central Hospital located in Lilongwe the capital of Malawi. Dr. Baker Henson, the mission leader said "The mission was very successful considering it was the first mission in Malawi for Operation Medical. In one week's time, the team made a significant impact on a local area in Malawi. The entire team worked exceptionally well together and remained flexible throughout the mission. Each individual was key to the success of the mission." Dr. Henson is looking forward to future missions in Malawi.

Malawi is a small country in southern Africa and is situated east of Zambia, west and north of Mozambique and south of Tanzania. Malawi has a population of approximately 16.7 million people. About 80% of the population lives in rural areas with 53% of the population below the poverty line. Life expectancy is 52 years. As of now there are less than 50 registered surgeons working in the country. Lilongwe, the capital of Malawi, has a population of approximately 800,000 people and is located on the main road between Zambia and Lake Malawi. The population of Lilongwi is rapidly growing due to extreme poverty and starvation that brings people from rural villages into the city. Kazumu Central Hospital is a government run hospital and is the tertiary referral center for the central region of Malawi serving about 6 million persons. Estimates of the hospital's size range from 600 to 1,000 beds; however, actual occupancy is probably closer to 1,200 to 1,500 occupancy. The hospital has 4 operating theatres and one ICU with 4 beds. The majority of their patients are those who cannot afford private facilities. Currently there are 3 general surgeons on staff at Kazumu Central Hospital.

Mission Details and Participants

The 5 day camp was held at Kazumu Hospital from October 6 to October 10, 2014. Prior to the start of the 5-day camp, Dr. Bipin Patel presented a lecture to 3rd year medical students attending the Medical College of Lilongwe. The lecture, "Gastro-Intestional Malignancies", was presented to 18 students and focused predominately on colon cancer.

Next Stop : Mehsana, India

The Lion General Hospital located on Jail Road in Mehsana has invited Operation Medical to conduct a surgical mission camp. This 250 bed, multispecialty hospital was founded in 1978, and is overseen by the Lions Club of Mehsana Charitable Trust. The hospital also hosts several academic programs for training in various medical fields including a college of physicians and surgeons as well as a variety peramedical curriculum. This busy facility served over 12,000 patients in their inpatient departments last year! You can learn more about the hospital at www.lionshospitalmehsana.com.

The hospital's vision statement, "Committed to provide the quality healthcare needs of the needy and poor patients in North Gujarat & Gujarat Border of Rajasthan" aligns with Operation Medical's mission of "serving communities that do not have adequate access to medical care." A team of about 30 volunteers will leave for Mehsana on January 15, 2015 and perform many surgical procedures for the people in the area. Our volunteers give their vacation time and finances to make the trip. Specialties include General, Plastic, Gynecology, Neck and Throat, and Urology.

Operation Medical's 2015 India Team is already packing and preparing for the trip. The long journey will take them about 7,600 miles from home where they will arrive in Ahmedabad. They will then transfer by road to Mehsana, a municipal city situated in the Mehsana district, which is located in the state of Gujarat. It is located at a distance of 74 km from Ahmedabad in western India. Functioning as the administrative headquarters of the districts, it covers over 4,500 km with 2 million inhabitants, or about 462 people per square kilometer!

The city is known for its local Mehsani breed of buffalos. The Mehsana District Cooperative Milk Producers' Union Ltd., popularly known as Dudhsagar Dairy, is a member of the state-level - Gujarat Cooperative Milk Marketing Federation Ltd., Dudhsagar Dairy is the largest dairy in Asia, processing on an average 1.41 million kilograms of milk each day. It has established a network for procuring milk from 4,500,000 milk producers through 1150 village milk cooperatives.

Much of the population works in agriculture growing Bajra, Indian for Pearl Millet and Jowar, known as Sorghum. Additionally vegetables are grown such as mirch (a type of pepper), mung beans and Jowar, which is the third most important food crop both with respect to area and



production. Major trading crops are oilseeds such as cumin, psyllium and anise.

The city is quite important from an Industrial perspective - Mehsana Fields are one of the largest on-shore oil producing assets of the Oil and Natural Gas Corporation headquartered in Dehradun, India. Covering 6,000km, the 28 fields have 1,311 oil wells, 16 gas wells and produce about 5,800 tons per day.

Mehsana has a presence of many major educational institutes. There are over 9 engineering colleges and five pharmacy colleges in the district. Ganpat University, located 10 km from city, offers specializing in areas as IT, engineering, pharmacy, agriculture, science, management, arts and commerce. Additionally there are many primary and higher secondary schools like N.G. International School and Gurkul English medium School the goal of which is to provide the best English education.

The city has several structures of historical significance. One of which is the Rani Udaymati Vav which is an architectural wonder of Gujarat. It is one of the largest step wells of the state. The Vav was constructed by Queen Udaymati in 11th century, in the loving memory of her Husband, King Bhimdeva I of the Chalukya Dynasty. The well is beautifully adorned with 800 stone sculptures and reliefs. One can see the impressive images of Hindu Gods, their incarnations and their consorts. The artistic and architectural majesty of the well is rarely to be seen elsewhere. Another interesting land mark is the Langhanaj Locality. It is an excavation site, where 14 fossilized skeletons and monoliths were unearthed. The locality bears evidence to the life of early man of Langhanaj. It bears close affinity with the East Africans.
