It feels like just yesterday that a group of enthusiastic and eager volunteers met to discuss and decide about forming a new organization to help alleviate the surgical needs of the world. OPERATION MEDICAL was born in June of 2013. Our volunteers hit the ground running as most of us were experienced in this line of work for many years with other organizations.

Operation Medical has now reached a significant milestone of five years. In the short time we have been in existence, we have accomplished 11 successful surgical missions on three continents performing over 1,200 surgical procedures without any major complications and 1,400 other procedures. The other procedures included sonogram studies, emergency room procedures, breast cancer screenings, dental procedures and OB/GYN and surgery clinic cases.

Operation Medical has a very talented and deep pool of participants that includes surgeons, anesthesia personnel, and nurses, as well as ancillary help. Our participants work together resulting in successful and rewarding missions.

We are blessed to have dedicated volunteers in all areas of need from warehouse logistics to mission participants. The mission participants have come from near and far, thanks to favorable word of mouth and the website.

We also have a very supportive Board of Directors. Some of our non-medical Board members even participate in a mission or two to get a better understanding of the work that is done during the missions.

On behalf of Operation Medical, I sincerely thank all the volunteers for their time, talent, and resources in making our missions so successful. Almost all of our volunteers utilize their own vacation time and money to participate in the missions.

In this fiscal year, Operation Medical exceeded the generous support we received by over 43 percent! This support helped us provide financial assistance to residents and nurses so they could join our mission teams and purchase much needed supplies, medicine and equipment.

I would like to express my heartfelt gratitude to our sponsors and donors. Because of your generosity, Operation Medical is able to continue to achieve our goals. A special mention needs to be made to the Hersha Group for providing us, since our inception, with office and warehouse space, mission logistical help and Board members.

After 13 hours of travel, the Operation Medical team of 18 arrived at Hospital Pierre Payen's (HPP) questhouse. This was the seventh trip this group made to HPP since the earthquake of 2010. It was the fourth trip on behalf of Operation Medical.

Haiti 2017 Hospital Pierre Payen

OCTOBER 21 - NOVEMBER 4, 2017

THE PLACE:

Haiti is the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere and one of the poorest in the world. It is about the size of Maryland and has a population of 11 million. Hospital Pierre Payen (HPP) is located in the city of Montrouis that is two hours northwest of the capital city of Port-au-Prince and 10 miles south of St. Marc. The main highway that passes through Haiti (two-lane asphalt) is between the regular medical clinic / guesthouse and the hospital.



JESULET DELICE is a 57-year-old man from St. Marc who came to HPP with several malignant melanoma skin lesions on his back, face, head and arm. His one ear also had very bad skin lesions. Dr. Reidell felt that the ear should be removed; however, because the procedure required reconstruction, Dr. Reidell felt a plastic surgeon should perform the procedure.

Jesulet is married and has a daughter and is the only albino in his family. He came with a folder that included photos of his family and shared those photos to everyone - he asked that we take a photo of him holding those photos. Jesulet previously sold goods in the market but now because of the sun he does not work in the market anymore.

He heard about Operation Medical being at HPP on the radio and felt that being treated by the doctors is "beautiful" and "God's will". He said he needed sun screen and couldn't afford any; however, ALL of the mission participants very eagerly donated their sun screen to this absolutely pleasant and extremely grateful man. He was so thankful that we helped him and gave him the sun screen.

THE STORY:

Throughout the year a team of excellent Haitian physicians handles the medical needs of patients including deliveries at the medical clinic and in a small inpatient unit adjacent to the clinic. They do not have surgeons on full time staff and therefore rely on several visiting surgical teams from the United States. There are approximately five to six such surgical visits every year.

This was a wonderful team. Many were strangers when we boarded our flights but quickly bonded to become a very effective, compassionate, and mutually supporting medical team. This was the first time that we had doctors trained in internal medicine to manage our clinic. It represented a tremendous upgrade. A total of 250 patients were seen in the clinic and, of these, 48 underwent surgical procedures. Another first for our group was the addition of a urologist during the second week who did multiple surgical procedures for relief of urinary obstruction. Again, this was a valuable addition to the team. This year, we also had excellent surgical and anesthesia staffing. They were busy all day every day in the operating room. Having a new autoclave was a major help on this trip.

Among the surgical procedures, there were three done as emergencies. These included two incarcerated inguinal hernias in adult males and one middle-age male with a huge painful mass in his abdomen. The mass turned out to be a tumor of the spleen, which had grown attachments to many nearby organs.

Other new things noted at the hospital include a new 60 kw generator provided by donors from central Pennsylvania and a new Medical Director. On January 18, 2018, a new couple arrived to help with Hospital management. Dawn and Mike Vandervort from Hanover, Pennsylvania, are very well qualified since both are nurses and both have spent about 10 years together in Haiti. They are totally fluent in Creole and have a great understanding of Haiti as a country. This will make a huge difference with future teams coming to HPP.


OCTOBER 21 - NOVEMBER 4, 2017



JOEL ANTOINE is five-years old and was brought to HPP by his mother. The family lives in St. Marc and traveled two hours to HPP when she heard that Operation Medical was going to be at HPP. His mother came to Haiti five years ago from the United States to join her husband who is a native Haitian. Joel also was accompanied by his sister who he said was "an angel." Joel's father had recently left the family and Joel's mother was desperately trying to get back to the United States. Dr. Packer and Dr. Callahan performed a hernia repair and Joel and his family left HPP later in the day to stay with friends in Montrouis. Joel's mother was very grateful that her son was able to be treated by the Operation Medical team.







DR. JOHN JUDSON

Operation Medial would like to give special recognition to Dr. John Judson and the tireless work that he has devoted to helping the people of Haiti.

During the years from 1968 to 2017. Dr. Judson has participated in over 80 surgical medical trips to Haiti and

was instrumental in establishing our relationship with the Hospital Pierre Payan and the Church of God facility that houses the surgical camp volunteers. During this time, he also made ten similar trips to Nicaragua. For two years, from June 1997 to July 1999, he was at the Albert Schweitzer Hospital serving as Medical Director and Chief of Surgery. Dr. Judson's wife, Ann Marie served as Housing Director and Special Assistant to co-founder, Mdme Gwen Mellon.

In 2010 he started going to the Pierre Payan Hospital in Haiti with the Carlisle Presbytery and then in 2013 with Operation Medical.

The reason that he does these mission trips is that he goes home "Having given more than he got - he could never repay the debt." "The trips have been truly gratifying experiences."

In January 2017 Dr. Judson visited Port-a-Prince Pediatric Hospital with the Gift of Life working at the open heart hospital.

Dr. Judson will not be joining the 2018 team and will be greatly missed by everyone. He is a wise and trusted leader and role model that provides his guidance, motivation and emotional support.



Tamoxifen Study in Haiti

In 2017, Operation Medical's Haiti team under the leadership of Dr. John Judson, was the first team to incorporate its own medical team with an established surgical team. This medical arm included Dr's Scott Barnes and Joseph Cincotta, as well as a dedicated nursing staff. Dr. Judson's foresight was correct; not only did the medical team assit in aiding the surgical team by allowing it to be more efficient, but also in delivering additional care to the Haitian community.

The medical team saw many advanced breast cancer cases among the Haitian women in this impoverished area, where there was no additional care available to them unless they traveled close to two hours to Port au Prince. Dr. Barnes, being a a retired Medical Oncologist and Hematologist, started to think of some way to start a breast cancer education program, early detection and medical treatment for breast cancer in addition to surgery, at the Hospital of Pierre Payen. From this humble beginning, the *Tamoxifen Study in Haiti*, became a reality.

This project under the approval and oversight of Operation Medical, became a reality in Haiti on May 7, 2018. Our mission ..." is to decrease morbidity and mortality of breast cancer in rural Haiti by increasing awareness of this neoplasia and of the potential for successful treatment through education, a primary care system without economic or culture barriers and access to a functioning referral system for basic surgical and hormonal treatment".

Patient educational pieces on early detection and self-breast examination are now available in their native Haitian Creole with pictures, since approximately 50 percent of the population has not had formal education. Special medical educational brochures have also been prepared for the Haitian physicians and nurses about early detection and methods to refer patients to the breast cancer clinic. This material, including the medical charts, are supplied in English as well as French, which is the official written language for medical reports. This was our first and major step in delivering breast cancer care to Haiti.

Secondly, we have made available a dedicated breast cancer clinic at Pierre Payen that we believe is only the third such clinic outside of Port au Prince (in a country of 11 million

people). So now in addition to surgery, we can offer these patients Tamoxifen, that is a hormone to fight cancer in about 80 percent of women with breast cancer. This is given as a pill that they take daily and is dispensed free of charge. They return monthly to see the breast cancer coordinator and are seen at least every three months by a physician. Careful records and data are maintained so we can follow progress and add to the data based on breast cancer care in Haiti.

This much involvement cannot just be done from a distance but requires that Operation

Operation Medical family of friends and supporters.

Although the Breast Cancer Clinic's beginnings are humble from our perspective, this is a major step forward for these Hatian women. They have so little but wish to show their gratitude in the form of a gift, much like the "old-time family physician" receiving gifts from their patients. The Haitians are a gracious people and their family members often return later in the day just to thank you for the care their loved one has received. This is no small feat in a country as hot as Haiti



Medical volunteers travel to Haiti 4 to 5 times yearly; in addition to the professionals 'on the ground" in Haiti to deliver care daily. Drs. Scott Barnes and Joe Cincotta are the study's program directors, Jennifer Stoner, is our pharmacist and advisor, and Mary Jensik is our CPA: all these individuals are volunteers. In Haiti, we have two Breast Cancer Coordinators: Ms. Vandervort, RN and Ms. Joseph, a pharmacy technician and our Haitian physicians.

We hope to continue to reach our goal by obtaining a mammography unit for the Hospital of Pierre Payen for early detection and follow-up, as well as additional therapies for breast cancer in the future. We can only accomplish this with the help and aid of our

where many people have to walk to where they are going.

Since May 2018, we have continued to see patients at the Breast Cancer Clinic. Surgeons, family physicians and family continue to refer patients for therapy. The start has been slow but steady, due in part to a great fear of the patients to admit they even have breast cancer. Until Operation Medical started this program, women in Haiti had virtually no options open to them for treatment. All they knew is that when one of their female friends or family members was diagnosed with breast cancer - they died. One out of nine Hatian women will develop breast cancer; therefore, patient and physiucian education is our priority at the Breast Cancer Clinic.

Over the course of five days, the group was able to perform 169 surgical procedures and over 100 dental procedures.

India 2018 District Hospital Panna

JANUARY 21 - 25, 2018

THE PLACE:

District Hospital Panna is located in Panna, Madhya Pradesh, India. Madhya Pradesh, a large state in central India, retains landmarks from periods throughout Indian history. Begun in the 10th century, its Hindu and Jain temples at Khajuraho are renowned for their carvings, most prominently Kandariya Mahadeva, a temple with more than 800 sculptures. Traveling to Panna, one generally flies into Khajuraho where in the past year they have opened a beautiful modern airport. The often-hair-raising ride to Panna takes you through narrow and winding roads through the Kanha Tiger preserve, an Indian National Park. Arriving in Panna, one finds themselves in a rural setting of rolling meadows dotted with evergreen trees, rocks, hills and forests.

Legend says that Panna was once the resting place of Pandavas. Also it is the area where princes used to hunt. The diamond mines in Panna are the largest diamond producing mines in India and all diamond mines are managed under the Diamond Mining Project of National Mineral Development Corporation of the Government of India.



THE STORY:

As is custom in this part of the world, the welcome and greetings afforded to the team were humbling. Upon arrival at Khajuraho airport, the team was met with leis made from beautiful marigolds. Once loaded up with all the gear, the procession to the hotel ensued. Upon arrival, the entire staff of the hotel as well as hospital officials greeted the group with more flowered leis, rose petals and many smiles and blessings.



Once hotel rooms were assigned, the team headed right to the hospital to get the lay of the land and start the process of unpacking and organizing supplies to be able to begin surgeries on Sunday morning. The items left in Valsad, India, had arrived at the hospital, but the baggage brought by participants had to be transported to Panna by truck and would not arrive until Sunday morning. It was a quick evening with a meal at the hotel and everyone turned in for a fast sleep!

The week sped by with mornings starting at 7:00am in the very chilly dawn of the day with an outdoor hot breakfast prepared by the hotel and then we were off to the hospital by 7:30 to start the day. The team worked together as if they had been doing this all their lives in this very place. No obstacle was too tall or wide and the teamwork was astounding.





Volunteers continue to report that the gift of giving is returned many times over being blessed by the experience. The team used their skills to help patients, their families, co-volunteers and local hospital staff.

On September 29, 2017, a team of 18 members consisting of doctors, nurses, and support staff embarked on its journey to Chitwan Hospital Medical College, nestled in the village of Bharatpur, Nepal.

Nepal 2017 Chitwan Hospital Medical Center

SEPTEMBER 29 - OCTOBER 6, 2017

THE PLACE:

Chitwan Hospital Medical College is located in Bharatpur, Nepal, a city in central-south Nepal. Bharatpur is a place where you can find hot weather, tropical forests and stunning natural scenery. There is an incredible variety of historical and religiously important sites that include Devghat, one of the most holy places for Hindus; Ganeshthan Temple, which is believed to have been constructed in the 15th century; Shashwat Dham, a venerated Hindu shrine solely dedicated to Lord Shiva - one of the three important deities within Hinduism; Chitwan National Park, which is filled with hundreds of species of flora and fauna; and the Tikauli Jungle.



SHANTI MAYA **TAMANG** is a 31 year old housewife with five small children. She was brought to Chitwan by her sister and was diagnosed with Cholelithiasis. She had a lot of pain from gall stones and it was difficult for her to take care of her children. Her surgical goal was her overall health will improve, she will have no more pain and would be able to get back to her daily duties. She was happy that she was able to be seen by the Operation Medical surgeons because she might not have been able to have the surgery otherwise.

THE STORY:

After a 19-hour flight, the team arrived safely in Kathmandu. On September 30, 2017, the group embarked on its final journey to Bharatpur, Nepal. After arriving and getting settled in the hotel, the group made its way to the hospital to unpack the medical supplies, and prepare for the start of the mission. On October 1, 2017, the mission began with a meeting with the staff from the hospital.

The week flew by with the team gathering for breakfast about 7:00 am each morning and then swiftly going to the hospital to begin the day. At the beginning of each day at the hospital, a staff meeting was held to prepare for the day's cases. As always with each mission, the group worked together as a team to deliver the best medical services possible. A total of 29 surgical cases were performed during the four-day mission trip.

Educationally, on the morning of October 4, 2017, Dr. DeLone delivered a presentation to the students on trauma techniques used by doctors and nurses in the United States. Later that day, staff visited the Chitwan Medical College and talked with their staff to discuss how the college worked. The group also met some of the students and was given a tour of the facility.

Operation Medial was fortunate to have professional photographer Syed Yaqueen join us during our surgical camp in Nepal. We give a special thanks to Syed for the photographs that he took during the mission.



DILLI BAYAMBU is a 45 years old and resides in the district of Nawa Parashi. They arrived at the hospital by bus. She is a housewife and her family members are farmers. She takes the cattle to the field each day. She was disgnosed with uterine prolapse and in her condition had a difficult time getting the cattle to the field. She believed that the surgery would make it much easier to do her chores and take care of her family. Her son-in-law and daughter took care of her

HAITI 2018


Operation Medical is sending a 25-member surgical/medical team to Pierre Payen October 13 - 27, 2018 for a two-week medical/surgical mission. Pierre Payen is located on the northern coast of the island, approximately a 1 1/2 hour drive from the capital of Port-au-Prince. The team consists of volunteers with expertise in general surgery, obstetrics-gynecology and urology. The medical team will be assisting and supporting the surgical staff as well as offering medical care for hundreds of people in the hospital clinic. This is Operation Medical's fifth mission in Haiti to provide surgical and medical care for the people in this impoverished area.

INDIA 2019

Operation Medical is pleased to announce a return visit to Kasturba hospital in Valsad India January 20 - 25, 2019. This will be Operation Medical's third mission to Kasturba Hospital in Valsad which is in the Western Indian state of Gujarat.

Kasturba Hospital is the largest hospital in Valsad and does not receive help of any kind, nor financial aid from the government, surviving solely on donations. Much like Operation Medical, the Kasturba Hospital is committed to promoting and providing high quality medical care and education to their community.

2017-2018 Financials

Operation Medical practices good stewardship with all funds entrusted to our mission and using these funds wisely allows us to serve more patients around the world. Operation Medical is a 501 (c)(3) nonprofit organization supported by people who believe in our work. Support comes in the form of contributions from individuals (cash and donated time), corporations (cash, donated assets and services), and foundations.

Operation Medical classifies expenses in three primary categories: program expense, fundraising and supportive services (management/general expense) and in our fiscal year 2017-18 we spent a total of \$472,867.

Program expenses in fiscal year 2017-18 of \$443,862 represents 94 percent of total expenses. These funds helped to provide financial assistance to nurses and residents and purchase medicine and medical supplies and portable equipment for our surgical camps. Program expense also includes the valuation of the contributed professional services that are provided by the doctors and nurses that join our teams and the donated office and warehouse space donated by the Hersha Group.

Operation Medical also receives a significant amount of skilled, contributed time which is not recorded in our financial statements. Approximately 975 hours of time were provided by volunteers supporting program services during the year. The duties of these volunteers vary from warehouse workers to mission support and is valued at \$23,938 based on the Independent Sector's State value of volunteer hours.


Program expenses also include medical supplies and medicines that it has received at no cost from Americare and Global Links, which was valued at \$8,894.

For the fiscal year 2017-18 Operation Medical incurred no fundraising expenses.


